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Burning the Clocks 21 December Brighton Beach at Madeira Drive

On 21st December, the shortest day of the year, Same Sky-Brighton's community art charity- produces a much-loved free event called Burning the Clocks. Local people make their own paper and willow lanturns to be carried through the city in a lantern parade then pass them into the fire on Brighton Beach as a token of the end of the year.

Same Sky states that the event is "an antidote to the excesses of the commercial Christmas... The lantern makers become part of the show, as they invest the lanterns with their wishes, hopes, and fears into a secular format that can be enjoyed by all regardless of faith or creed, and then pass them into the fire. No lantern is better for its purpose than any other, all are unique to the maker and precious but all are given up to be burnt to

greet the lengthening days..."

Around 2000 participants meet at the Brighton Dome Corn Exchange on Church Street at 5pm where their lanterns will be safety-checked by officials. The lit lantern parade starts at 6pm and progresses down New Road at Madeira Drive. At around 7:15, the final parade group reaches the beach and is greeted by drumming. The participants then add their lanterns to the beach bonfire creating a sizzling spectacle reminicient of the Burning Man fiesta in Nevada. As the drumming builds to a crescendo, larger lanterns explode, and fireworks are launched at around 8pm. The best viewing points are from on the high ground of Madeira Drive, behind safety barriers.

LSI Spotlight: Dan Sherrington





For those seeking reassurance that all of your papers are in order, Dan Sherrington is your first point of contact. Much more than a luxurious head of hair and a set of broad shoulder to cry on, he is an integral part keeping the LSI Brighton "family" happy and healthy (and he can blow a mean saxophone!)

Momo, LSI Living: Hey Dan, first of all, tell us your background and how long you have been working at LSI...

Dan, Administrative Manager: Hi! Well, I have been working for LSI since 2006, and was Registrar and Accommodation officer until 2009, when I was promoted to Administrative Manager. Before that, I worked as a Teacher and Student Welfare Officer for 3 years. I first came to Brighton to study at Sussex University in 1999 and have lived here ever since. I also play saxophone in my spare time, and like to travel a lot.

Momo: When was LSI established? How many students are enrolled each year?

Dan: This has been a language school for a very long time – since 1965! In 1979, the company changed its name to LSI. There are 25 different LSIs around the world now, but Brighton was one of the first. Language schools are big business in Brighton, and we get more than 600 students every year.

Momo: In regards to teachers, origins of students, and atmosphere, what changes have you noticed over the years?

Dan: We are very lucky at LSI that we keep many of the same teachers year after year, so there are many of the same faces working here. Students have changed though. We used to get many more students from Europe, but they are much fewer these days. In recent years, we have been getting many more students from South America and the Arabic countries, especially Libya.

Momo: There are only two weeks left before the end of 2014. What changes are in store for at LSI in 2015?

Dan: The big changes for LSI from 2014 into 2015 will be in technology. We have a fantastic new online system that allows teachers and students at all LSIs around the world to access some fantastic study materials, and share information outside of class. This is going to be used a lot in 2015, and students will see this in classroom and will even be able to take classes online from their home country.

Momo: According to the student satisfaction questionaire, LSI Brighton has a 98% satisfaction rate. How do you explain this success?

Dan: That's true – most of our students are very happy! There are lots of reasons, but I think one of the most important is our friendly atmosphere. We are a small school, and so we have time to get to know our students, and make them feel that they are part of a family here, not just another number.

Momo : Finally, there are many school of English in Brighton, what makes this school attractive ?

Dan: Again, I think its our friendly atmosphere and personal touch. We also have some very well experienced and qualified teachers who are enthusiastic about their jobs.
